Public Hearing was called to order by Chairman Klink at 5:31 p.m.

Waukesha County Senior Planner Leto read the public hearing notice.

Waukesha County Representative Smith stated this is right near the corner of Center Oak Road where it takes a 90-degree turn. This was split about a year ago, and the applicant is proposing to re-combine the parcels and the reason this needs a conditional use permit is for land altering activity. The parcel is zoned R-1 and there is also a partial primary environmental corridor overlay over the south end of the parcel. That has more to do with a slope that goes down into a kettle down by Lake Keesus. Further to the east there is the Deer Crossing Estates subdivision which was developed in 1995. The reason for the conditional use is to achieve a full exposure walk out basement, significant earth moving is required -roughly a 4-foot cut to the southwest of the home and then roughly 4 feet of fill to the northeast of the property as well as 3 to 4 feet cut to level the backyard. A question the public raised prior to this meeting was regarding drainage, so Waukesha County's Land Resources Division reviewed it, and their engineer was comfortable with the grading plan. It's keeping the water on the property, drawing it south into the primary environmental corridor.

Commissioner Good asked if the primary environmental corridor drops off. Waukesha County Representative Smith replied it's pretty steep, and the environmental corridor continues southward toward the lake and goes westward. Water draining there won't create a problem.

The public hearing was opened for public comments and concerns. There were none.

The public hearing closed at 5:36 p.m.
